"As details continue to emerge from Orlando, our collective sadness, anger and grief is overwhelming. Our hearts are with those anxiously awaiting word of the safety of their loved ones, or who are already trying to cope with the unbearable loss of innocent lives. We thank the many first responders who saved, and continue to save lives.

PFLAG knows that the effects of this deliberate shooting spree that targeted an LGBTQ nightclub on Latin Night will ripple across the country, reviving anxiety and painful emotions for anyone who has experienced hateful actions themselves or against loved ones because of who they are. We concur with President Obama's message: This unprecedented massacre, this act of terror, this act of hate against people who are LGBTQ, was an attack on the fundamental belief in equality and dignity for all people.

At PFLAG, it tragically reminds us that our work is far from over. As ambassadors of love and hope, PFLAG members will continue to support our extended family of LGBTQ people, families, and allies through these dark, anxious moments and beyond. Let us join in unity to end violence and hatred."

The **Mary Wagner Memorial Scholarship** is our longest running scholarship – 17 years! Friends of Mary Wagner, Art and Marilyn Carpenter and Sharon Murphy, have made this annual scholarship possible. The recipient is **Brandon Ishikata**, who obtained his California Multiple Subjects Teaching Credential from San Diego State University in the spring. He will continue at Loyola University in July to pursue his Master of Education in Higher Education. While at SDSU, a partial list of his accomplishments include: a leader in the SafeZones Ally Program, Residential Advisor, an SDSU Ambassador, served on Aztec P.R.I.D.E. (Philanthropic Role in Development and Education), and was selected for the N.A.S.P.A. program (National Association of Student Personnel Administrators). There wouldn't be enough room to list all that Brandon has accomplished as an undergraduate and graduate student.



Brandon's essay:

"When one thinks of a homecoming king, many people automatically associate it with a silly high school popularity contest. People

assume that the title is only given to someone based off looks and their large social network. However, in 2015 at San Diego State University (SDSU), as an openly gay student, I defied the odds and was crowned the university homecoming king. At SDSU, it is a prestigious service position. In my one-year term, I developed, conceived, and executed a campus wide project called, 'A Kaleidoscope of Abilities.' My service project focused on disability awareness and arts appreciation.

Throughout the project, the students, faculty and staff participated in a morning experimental piece where they had a chance to 'walk' in the shoes of someone with a disability. At night, our program concluded with a talent showcase, which included a deaf alumnus dancing Bachata [a Latin dance], a professor performing an original spoken word piece, and an all-female a capella group & the American Sign Language Club signing and singing to 'Demons' by Imagine Dragons. The 'Kaleidoscope of Abilities' has truly made a positive difference by providing the disability community a voice for their rights, unifying the campus and opening a new perspective about diversity. The project was a major success that over 300 participants attended. In fact, the project was so successful that the SDSU Disability Services department now sponsors it as an annual campus event.

To continue my vision of making an inclusive world, I aspire to fulfill my childhood dream of being an elementary school teacher. In elementary school, I was a previous victim of bullying and understand the agony many LGBT youth face. As a future teacher, I hope to educate school professionals through LGBT ally training. I want to teach my colleagues how to best support their students and how they can create a safe learning environment. With raising drop-out rates, it is vital that we educate our professionals on supporting our youth's emotional needs. On a school wide level, I want to develop inclusivity initiatives such as a peer counselor program. In my personal teaching philosophy, I feel that students should leave my classroom learning not only the curriculum, but also strong character and citizenship skills. As a teacher, I want students to know that my classroom is a 'safe zone' and I aim to be a role model for LGBT youth. I want them to know that Mr. Ishikata loves his students and wants to them to be the best version of themselves.

When I was coming out of the closet, I remember my heart racing before I announced to my parents that I was gay. I feared their rejection. I expected a horrific blowout, but was instead given love and support. During this emotional

## **WAY TO GO!** *Written by Lorraine Wilson*

In December of 2015, my then 12 year old daughter, Rylee, told me in strict confidence that she is gay. She did not want me to tell my husband (her father), or my sisters, or anyone else for that matter. So I got busy looking for resources... support groups, therapy, and anything else I could find. This led me to the LGBTQ center in Oceanside. I called and then stopped in one afternoon in January. I talked to the wonderful Linda and she was a full of information and so supportive. She suggested I go to a PFLAG meeting and said that she would also recommend some therapist for me. Around the same time my daughter's close friend told his mom that he is gay. I connected with his mother and we attended our first PFLAG meeting together in early February of 2016.

My first PFLAG meeting was a life changing experience for me. It was there that I met Annette Ottone (Regional Director of PFLAG North County). Annette knew exactly how I was feeling and was so helpful. My biggest problem that night was that I had known for almost 2 months that my daughter is gay and she still didn't want her father to know. This is not a secret that I felt comfortable keeping from my husband, yet I also wanted to respect my daughter's wishes and not "out" her to anyone, including her father. So I was stuck! And this was hurting me. I even lied to my husband about where I was that evening. Annette in all her wisdom talked to me about her own experience and about ways to tell my husband.

I went home and asked my daughter that same evening to please tell her father. She was afraid of his reaction and refused to tell. I explained that the secret was not good for our family nor my marriage, but that didn't help to convince her. I finally suggested that I be the one to tell him and she agreed! The very same night as my first PFLAG meeting I told my husband that our daughter is gay. He was hurt that I hadn't told him sooner. Both my husband and Rylee are quiet people that don't talk much about feelings. It took them a while to talk and reconnect, but it happened in time, and now their relationship is good again.

A few days later Annette emailed me and said that she wished my daughter's middle school had a GSA (Gay Straight Alliance) club and that we should think about starting one. I wasn't able to attend the March PFLAG meeting. Annette told me to bring Rylee to the April meeting as there would be college aged speakers that Rylee would enjoy. At this meeting we talked to Molly, a middle school counselor and GSA advisor in Escondido. She also suggested starting our own GSA at Valley Middle School. Rylee was interested, but I had no idea where to start! I planned on emailing our principal and counselor, but I was dragging my feet. In late April Annette emailed me and said she knew of a teacher at Valley that might be interested in being an advisor for the GSA club. So I emailed Beth Thomason at Valley. I told

Beth a little about my situation and asked if she'd be willing to help us start a GSA and be the advisor. This email was sent around 7:30am, and at 9:00am during Valley's morning break I got a call from Beth. We both talked about our daughters being gay and the need for a GSA at Valley. We cried happy tears and then set up a meeting to get started.

In early May I met with Beth, Kurt Dearie (GSA advisor for Carlsbad High), Annette, and my daughter Rylee. Kurt has been advising GSA at the high school since it started 13 years ago so this was our chance to learn from him. He helped us to set goals and get the logistics going. Rylee and I went home to write a constitution and fill out club paperwork as quickly as possible. We wanted to turn everything in ASAP so that it would get to the Board of Education and be approved before school was out. I met with the ASB advisor to make sure all the paperwork was correct. Rylee had to find four friends to be founding members of the club with her. She had a mental list of who she would ask, friends that knew she is gay, but aren't gay themselves. One by one her friends said no. This was her first heartbreak in this process, but not the last. We regrouped and called her friend whom is gay for advice. He is at a different middle school and will return to Valley next year to help found the GSA. He's been involved in this process and suggested a few kids that Rylee didn't think of. When she asked they said yes! Meanwhile Beth and Rylee decided to have an informational meeting for the GSA Club. Rylee and I got up early and got a box of donuts. Our plan was to send Rylee to school with the donuts and when kids asked to have one she'd say come find out about the GSA club and have a donut there. Thirteen kids showed up the first day. We were surprised and elated. The following week we did the same thing, but this time fifty kids showed up! I cried happy tears when I heard this news. Then Rylee came home from school and I cried angry tears. She told me that a boy called her a dike, also it was rumored that kids went to the meeting just to find out who is gay in order to pray for their sickness, and that another group was waiting outside the meeting saying hateful things while waiting to find out who is gay. This was a big setback. Again the adults got together with the kids and talked. Rylee was encouraged and praised for being brave and that was enough for her to want to move forward.

At the same time I found out that the club's approval process was stalling. There was a thought that maybe a letter should be sent to parents of the students in ASB that would vote to approve the club. I called the principal to discuss Rylee being bullied as well as the stall for club approval. The principal was very receptive and helpful in both areas. He has been cautious yet fair when dealing with the club. What is important to know here is that if a school has clubs, which Valley does, then by California law the GSA club has

to be approved. The only alternative is to remove all clubs from campus. So the ASB, principal, and School Board's approval is to follow protocol. I asked him to make sure the club was approved and the paperwork passed on to the Board in time to make it on the next agenda. He did just that!

In late May we took Rylee and two friends to visit the GSA at Carlsbad High School. This was an inspirational meeting where kids talked about the importance of support and understanding. Many students mentioned how much it would have helped them to have had a GSA in middle school. We are looking forward to getting the School Board's approval and officially starting our club.

## A MOTHER SHARES HER STORY

Annette Ottone came to Saint Matthew Church this past May for Mother's Day (2016) at my invitation to speak to our parish community during our Sunday masses about what it means to be a mother of a LGBT child. I had originally met Annette nearly thirty years ago when she and her fiancée, Remo Ottone, came to Saint Matthew Church for the first time to ask if I would officiate at their wedding ceremony. Not only did I officiate at their wedding but I also became their pastor for nearly twenty years as they became members of my parish. They had three children, two daughters and a son, whom I baptized when they were born, and confirmed when they were teenagers. Not only were Annette and her family active members in the parish of Saint Matthew of Orange, California but they had also become close friends of my own family.

Several years ago, the Ottone's relocated to Carlsbad and were no longer able to participate in the life of a parish so far away. Nonetheless, our friendship continued and they never cut ties with Saint Matthew Church. So I was able to keep up with the growth and development of their three children. When I became aware that one of her daughters came out as being gay I was happy to know that Annette and Remo were able to embrace their daughter and continue to support her as she grew from adolescence into early adulthood. Like so many other parents this is something you do not expect when you are raising your children. Needless to say, Annette and Remo were the kind of loving parents who were able to respond in the most loving and supportive way to their daughter's sexuality. They had joined Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG) in order to become more effective parents of a gay child as well as to help other parents who were also blessed with such special children.

I have become so inspired by Annette's work as a mother of an LGBT child, as well as her involvement in the greater community through PFLAG, that I very much wanted her to

All of this happened so quickly and has been so positive for Rylee and our family. We've had so much help and support from friends, from Annette at PFLAG, Kurt from CHS, and Beth our fearless advisor. Just two months ago I wouldn't have dreamed that all of this could happen. Today they had their third informational meeting for the GSA and they were afraid that the negative things surrounding last week's meeting might scare some kids away, but 44 kids showed up. Forty freakin' four! Makes me cry happy tears. LGBTQ kids are here in middle school and they are ready to have a safe place to meet and a safe school to be part of.

share her experience with the members of our parish community. It has been a custom at Saint Matthew Church for the past several years for me to invite a mother to speak about the meaning of motherhood on Mother's Day. This year I had invited my friend, Annette, who readily accepted my invitation to be our featured Mother's Day guest "homilist" (speaker).

I was quite happy that she agreed to come to share her experience with the families of our faith community. This was the first time that I had a parent of an LGBT child come and publicly share about the meaning of the experience of the "coming out" of their child. I, myself, am a father of an LGBT child, but I had never mentioned that in any of my Sunday homilies, although many in the parish know of my son's sexual orientation. So having Annette Ottone come and speak about this topic was a first for our parish community.

Annette did not let us down. She was terrific! As I looked out across the faces of our congregation while she was speaking I could see many tears among those who were listening. There is nothing like the power of story and narrative to touch the depths of people's hearts. Annette's story did just that. She touched our hearts and she inspired an entire church congregation at a Sunday morning mass. Her faith in her God and in her daughter was evident; her hope for a more inclusive and kinder society was further realized; and her unconditional love was not only an inspiration but it also echoed the Gospel of compassionate love.

Annette, through her tireless work with PFLAG, is truly making a difference in our world. I know this because she has made a huge difference for the people a small congregation in Orange, California called Saint Matthew Ecumenical Catholic Church. We are truly seeing the dawn of a new day in human society as we become a more just, loving, and inclusive humanity. Human diversity should never be seen as a threat to fear but as a treasure to embrace.
